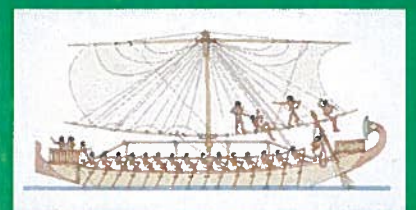

Continuing Education ***Wadi Gawasis***

The site of Wadi Gawasis, located on the Red Sea about 100 km east of Luxor (ancient Thebes, capital of Pharonic Egypt) has been under investigation by a joint Italian-American archaeological team since 2000. Artifacts including pottery, exotic wood and resins, inscribed stelae, stone anchors and reused ship timbers suggest that this was the ancient site of "Saw", the remote outpost from which Egyptian pharaohs sent trading expeditions to the land of Punt, reputed to be in the Horn of Africa.

This presentation will provide an overview of the archaeology performed on the site, with an emphasis on the maritime finds and efforts to preserve what may be the oldest known Egyptian seagoing vessel fragments.

Howard Wellman, a highly regarded conservator in both this country and abroad will speak on Wednesday, February 1 at 7:30 in the auditorium.



International Restoration of Sight

On February 8, at 7:30 in the auditorium Mr. Mahmood Farazdaghi, president of United to Restore Sight will speak to us about his work with that non-profit foundation which, in cooperation with major hospitals, provides free medical exams, nutritional supplements, glasses, eye exams and glasses and corrective surgery to children. He is also president of United to Restore Sight International,



president of the International Federation of Eye and Tissue banks and senior vice-president of "Tissue Banks International."

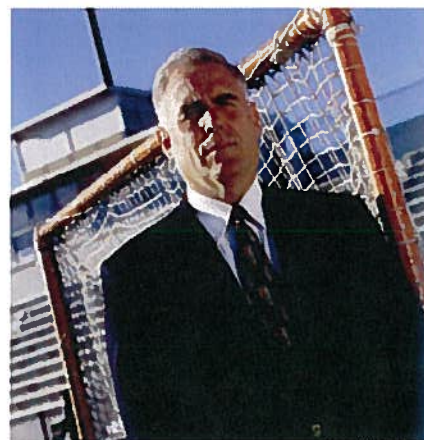
He came to the U.S. from Iran as a student in August 1966, worked at Johns Hopkins School of Medicine and went into research on immunology and microbiology of the eye at the Wilmer Eye Institute, where his focus (so to speak) was on blindness due to Vitamin A deficiency and corneal transplantation.

From 1966 to 2003 he was instrumental in establishing 30 eye banks in 26 countries and three international training centers in India and the Czech Republic. He has also provided free medical exams to school children in slums of major cities.

Lacrosse and University Athletics

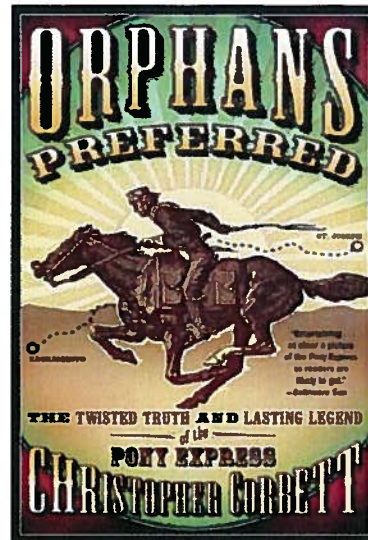
Mr. Calder is in his 24th year at Hopkins with the last 17 as director of athletics. He leads an athletic program that sponsors 24 varsity sports and one is the most successful in the nation. Johns Hopkins has placed in the top 40 in the final Director's Cup standings in each of the last 15 years while winning numerous Centennial Conference and HCAC championships. He has recently completed tenure as president of the United States Intercollegiate Lacrosse Association.

Baltimore Museum of Art

The Baltimore Museum of Art's outstanding collection encompasses 90,000 works of art, including the largest holding of works by Henri Matisse in the world, as well as masterpieces by Pablo Picasso, Paul Cézanne and Vincent van Gogh.

On Thursday, February 2, enjoy a self-guided tour of the museum. Several different exhibits are now showing including Embroidered Treasures: Textiles from Central Asia.

Approximately 14 bold, colorful embroidered textiles from Central Asia are being presented for the first time 20th-century textiles include wall hangings, covers, a wedding canopy, and saddle covers made in Afghanistan, Uzbekistan, and Tajikistan. They represent both city cultures and those of formerly nomadic peoples such as the Lakai. Primarily made of cotton with multicolored silk thread embroidery by young women and their female relatives, many of these textiles were used as part of their dowries and family treasures that were reluctantly parted with during periods of political and economic hardship.

Pratt Library

On January 21, 1882, Enoch Pratt offered a gift to the Mayor and City Council of Baltimore of a central library, four branch libraries and an endowment of \$1,058,333.00.

"My library," Mr. Pratt is attributed to have said, "shall be for all, rich and poor without distinction of race or color, who, when properly accredited, can take out the books if they will handle them carefully and return them."

The Enoch Pratt Free Library is one of the oldest free public library systems in the United States. How did it get started, what has it accomplished, and whom has it influenced over the years? Join us for a guided tour of the library on Tuesday, February 7.

In addition to learning about the unique history of the library, we will have the rare opportunity to visit the Mencken Room. The Mencken Room is open to the public



each year on Mencken Day, which is held on the Saturday closest to his birthday on September 12; however the exception is being made for us!

The Mencken Room houses the most important Mencken collection in the world, including the books in Mencken's personal library, typescripts and proofs of Mencken articles and books, correspondence and other Mencken artifacts.

Sundays at Central

Also featured on the

program is Karen Amrhein's Violin and Piano Sonata, described by music host and critic William Zagorski as an "expertly magnificent music featuring these two award-winning artists. The bus will depart at 2:30. This is a free concert.

Hippodrome

When Baltimore's Hippodrome Theatre was built shortly after the turn of the 20th century, it paired that era's cutting edge technology (motion pictures) with hand-crafted architectural details to create a lavish entertainment experience for patrons. Almost 100 years later, a complete renovation of the aging movie palace repeats history.



No longer a movie theater, the Hippodrome hosts some of today's most high-tech theatrical performances (i.e Broadway musicals). Theater-goers still experience the grandeur of a bygone era. Gorgeous details like the ornamental plasterwork and gilded moldings were lovingly restored.

In 2004, after a \$64 million renovation, this massive, ornate, 2,286-seat entertainment palace that once presented vaudeville acts began its second run as a premier entertainment destination on the East Coast.

Seniors who participated in such activities about once a week for a 20-year period reduced the risk of dementia by seven percent. Those who engaged in these activities more often reduced their risk even more -- by 63 percent!

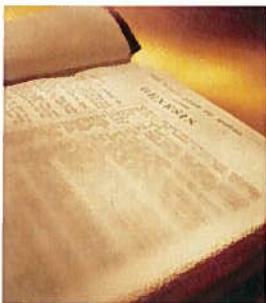

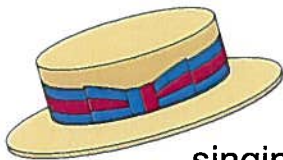
Dawn of the Maya

The TAXI 2 program allows eligible participants to purchase discount taxi vouchers. Taxi vouchers are available for purchase by CountyRide clients. They may be purchased only from the CountyRide office and will cost \$5 for a book of ten one-dollar vouchers. For people certified by CountyRide as low income, vouchers may be purchased for \$2.50 for a book of ten one-dollar vouchers.

If you are currently registered in the CountyRide program no additional form is needed (unless you wish to apply for the subsidized vouchers), but you must contact the office to indicate that you would like to register for the TAXI 2 program.
