Earth's Changing Climate

Earth's climate is changing, there's no doubt. Explore the complex forces that have influenced the evolution of our climate from Earth's formation to present day and the human causes of recent climate change. From Ice Ages and vanishing glaciers to rising sea levels, loss of species and the effects of Earth's orbit, we will look at the dynamic and fragile environment of our home planet, both natural and human-caused. Join Jim O' Leary for a 3 part series on Earth's Changing Climate on Wednesday, August 15, 22 and 29 at 7:30 in the Auditoruim.

Serving the Maryland Science Center (MSC) in numerous functions for more than 30 years, Mr. O'Leary is responsible for the planning, production and presentation of programs in MSC's Davis Planetarium and the Crosby Ramsey Memorial Observatory and is MSC liaison to large-format (IMAX) film producers and distributors. He has produced dozens of programs for the Davis Planetarium, seven of which have played in more than 650 planetariums worldwide.

Mr. O'Leary is a frequent lecturer on topics of Earth and space science to both adults and children, and a familiar face and voice on TV and radio, where he is often called upon to interpret space science and astronomy. Since 2001 he has hosted the weekly Skywatch radio program on the local NPR affiliate, introducing listeners to the latest space science and astronomy news.

Museum of Industry

Unlike many of America's museums, the Baltimore Museum of Industry's



collections do not document the lifestyles of the elite. You will not find fine art or furnishings. Rather, the 100,000 objects the BMI holds document the often-overlooked people in history- the workers, small business people, and citizens who built America. The BMI's collections are evocative reminders of

Baltimore's great history. They explain more effectively than any textbook, how the city developed from a small trading post to a thriving, industrial center of manufacturing and commerce in a few decades.

National Geographic Museum: Tomb of Christ & Titanic

Be virtually transported to Jerusalem and discover the fascinating history of the Church of the Holy Sepulchre in an immersive 3-D experience unlike anything you've seen in a museum before. We will be able to virtually visit the church and learn about its storied history and enduring mysteries. Please note, due to the large crowd at the Tomb of Christ exhibit, it is required that we make a reservation. Our reservation time is set for 11:12am. Our group must meet our assigned museum staff member 15min prior to our reservation time in front of the exhibit.

Once you have visited the Tomb of Christ, make your way over to the self-guided tour of Titanic: The Untold Story exhibit. This extensive exhibition will transport you to the height of transatlantic steamship travel, displaying items from the luxurious ocean liner and share stories, many for the first time of some aboard the ship on its tragic maiden voyage. See incredible images and artifacts, like the coat worn by Titanic survivor Marion Wright Woolcott, and never before exhibited ship and expedition memorabilia, including the 8,000-pound crew module from the

submersible Ballard and team used to survey the shipwreck.

The bus will depart promptly at 8:30 on Tuesday, August 7 and return by 4:00. Lunch will be on your on inside the museum café. The total cost of this trip is \$20. The deadline to cancel was Tuesday, July 24. This trip is rated **DIFFICULT**.

Woodbourne Creamery

Woodbourne Creamery at Rockhill Orchard is Montgomery County's first all new dairy facility in sixty years. In addition, they are the first all pasture robotic milking facility in North America. Licensed as a Grade A dairy and processing facility, they are selling Golden Guernsey Creamline milk at the market. They have a small herd of sixty Guernsey cows and have been raising them since 2001. Guernsey milk is distinctively different from store bought milk in that it is naturally high in beta carotene so has a slightly yellow color. In 2013 they installed a Voluntary Milking System. Cows come in to be milked when they want, typically between two to three times per day. Join us Tuesday, August 21, as we learn more about the cows, creamery, VMS, grazing operations and why the cows thrive on eating grass all day long.

We will have time to shop at the market after our tour. A picnic lunch will be served under a covered pavilion at the farm. When signing up please select either a ham or a turkey sandwich. Lunch includes water, chips and an ice cream at the farm. The total cost of the trip is \$15. The deadline to cancel is Wednesday, August 15. After that your account will be charged. The bus will depart at 9:15 and return by 3:00.

This trip is rated **DIFFICULT**. There is a tractor driven wagon ride to the creamery and uneven terrain at the farm. Wear appropriate walking shoes. We must have a minimum of 15 for this trip.

National Constitution Center

The National Constitution Center is the first and only institution in America established by Congress to "disseminate information about the United States Constitution on a



nonpartisan basis in order to increase the awareness and understanding of the Constitution among the American people." The Constitution Center brings the United States Constitution to life by hosting interactive exhibits and constitutional conversations and inspires active citizenship by celebrating the American constitutional tradition.

The museum's main exhibit includes three signature attractions: Signer's Hall, Constituting Liberty and the Hamilton Exhibit. The guide will be sure to give the group time to sit at various points during the tour. Once we have viewed the museum attraction, we will make our way to City Tavern for lunch.

Just as the founding fathers dined on elegant, sophisticated cuisine at City Tavern, so will you. John Adams called the City Tavern "the most genteel tavern in America," and the restaurant, founded in 1773, has hosted




