Wednesday, April 2nd at 7:30 p.m. Joseph Cassar: Enduring Themes I: Portraits

This lecture focuses on the history of portraiture starting from the earliest civilizations and coming up until today. Portraits have always intrigued artists; it was a way to immortalize a person, capturing their resemblance, character and personality. With time only Kings and the rich could afford a portrait, and they were intended to show power. Eventually portraits became available for everyone, and artists even started to paint

themselves. Today portraits are commissioned by organizations and governments as well as by private patrons. This is a richly stimulating lecture which outlines the development of portrait painting through the ages in rich colored images that invite questions and discussion.

Monday, April 7th at 7:30 p.m. Seth Kibel: Big Bands of the Swing Era Part II

For a roughly ten-year period, from the mid-1930's until the end of WWII, jazz and popular music were, for the only time in American history, one and the same. The musical stars of the "Swing Era," as it was called, were the big bands. In this second of a 2-part lecture, we'll explore the lives, careers, and

fabulous oeuvres of such legendary band leaders as Benny Goodman, Duke Ellington, Artie Shaw, Count Basie, The Dorsey Brothers, Glenn Miller, and more. Expect to hear familiar classics and possibly some undiscovered gems, as well. Classic recordings, video clips, as well as live performances from your lecturer will keep these presentations as lively as the music itself!

Monday, April 14th at 7:30 p.m. Joseph Cassar: Enduring Themes II: Landscapes

This lecture outlines how landscapes became a genre and an important theme for artists. We will hear about landscape painting or imitation of nature and gardens in ancient civilizations like Egypt, Greece and Pompei. Eventually the landscape came to an end in itself, and artists wanted to capture the trees, cloud formations and the forces of nature like storms and ships struggling in high seas. Landscape gained a symbolic meaning during the romantic period where a sunset or a view of the ocean became a contemplative subject for us to understand the fleeting moments of our lives on earth. Landscape became a key subject for the Impressionists and remains so for contemporary artists like Hockney and Kiefer. This is a richly stimulating lecture which outlines the development of landscape painting through the ages in rich colored images that invite questions and discussion.

Wednesday, April 30th at 7:30 p.m. Adrienne Garwood: National Aquarium

Adrienne Garwood is Director of Experiential Design at the National Aquarium. She oversees a team of content developers, designers and a product manager who focuses on upgrades to the in-building guest experience. Her work includes campus identity, signage, exhibits, and experiences that connect guests to nature to inspire compassion and care for our ocean planet. The National Aquarium is a national treasure and is the largest tourism attraction in the state of Maryland. Over 1.4 million visitors visit our Aquarium each year.








Saturday, April 19th: "History of the World Part I" (1981)




