They came to see their parents every Tuesday night for 20 years. When they passed away John and Carol said they would probably never come to Edenwald again. However! "When it came time for John and I to look at retirement communities we didn't think for long. We knew Edenwald was where we wanted to be. We knew the staff to be the very best and so friendly. What we didn't know was that we would be offered the same apartment as both of our parents – Apartment 1112 – where all four of our parents had been."

My 40 years at Edenwald have really flown by. I feel that I have been here for 40 years because my in-laws, Milton and Catherine Volker, moved here in November of 1985 and were here until 1984. My mother-in-law's cousin, Ruth Knox, moved here in 1987 and was here until 2011. My

husband Milton and I moved here in 2006. We have had a family member here continuously since Edenwald opened, so that is why I feel that I have been here for 40 years!

I have seen many changes over the years – too many to list. Some of the highlights were the crab feast, an annual event under a tent on the parking lot where the Terraces are now. We now have it in the garage on the 3rd floor. For dinner, you had to sign up and wait in the auditorium (the old one) and wait to be called after your entire party was present. The men had to wear jackets. No corduroy, jeans, t-shirts were allowed. Stroh Hall housed two people in a room. Unfortunately, my mother-in-law was in one of those for two years. I watched the Pat Martin room being built, and it was a beautiful dining venue for Stroh. It was where the rehab and medical offices are now. So many changes and all for the good.

Behind the front desk was a sitting area where the men would sit and kibbitz and smoke before we became a non-smoking facility. The beautiful chandelier hung in the lobby for residents and visitors to admire.

It has been a pleasure to watch Meghan Curtis mature from a teenage server in the dining room to the lovely, capable leader that she is today. If we don't know the answer or have a problem, we go to Meghan. We are so blessed to have her and all the wonderful employees. We are fortunate for the opportunities Edenwald provides our employees for growth. We have so many that have been here for a long time and that speak well for the administration.

It has been a pleasure to have been here for so long, and I look forward to being here a while longer to see the changes planned for the future.

<u>Wednesday, June 4th at 7:30 p.m.</u> Jack Burkert: The Patapsco River: An Essential History

Jack Burkert is a Baltimore native who in retirement has used his energy and interest in "all things Baltimore" as a part-time educator at the Baltimore Museum of Industry as well as through his own consulting firm. He is a 1969 honors graduate with a degree in history and education from the University of Maryland. His working life was spent with the Baltimore City School system, the Pennsylvania State University, plus private

employers in Washington and New York City. He will share with us the story of that river, from before the time of the Industrial Revolution and ocean-going ships calling at Elkridge Landing, through the trials of floods, then with an expanding industrial economy with the now major port forced to cope with growth, then major pollution. Large industries were established on the waterfront for riverfront access, people came and went on steamboats, while upstream, a new state park was created to protect the river offering recreational opportunities to the region's citizens. The river is the focus- its story and how it helped create a modern Baltimore region.

<u>Monday, June 9th at 7:30 p.m.</u> Greg Jones: Actor, Playwright, Teacher

Area actor/playwright/teacher Greg Jones shares six decades' worth of tales as he reminisces about going from local theatre to dinner theater to summer stock to television and back again. Along the way, he encountered minor celebrities and major stars and has lived to tell the tale. Join Greg as he relates how the Mayflower Madam once screamed at him, how he wound up writing a musical featuring foam-rubber fish, and how, yes, he and his club acting partner became the opening act for Barry Manilow's mom. terrors of understudying a future Oscar nominee to the joys of sharing a concert stage with jazz greats Max Roach, Dizzy Gillespie and Miles Davis, Greg's career has zigzagged from the sublime to the ridiculous.

He will tell us how the brothers worked their way up and show some of their funniest routines on stage, along with Groucho's amazing verbal wit.





Wednesday, June 18th at 7:30 p.m. Ronald J. Daniels: Future of American Universities

Ronald J. Daniels, J.D., President of Johns Hopkins University received his bachelor's and law degrees from the University of Toronto and a Master of Laws from Yale. Since 2009 he has served as the 14th president of Hopkins. He has been one of its most successful presidents, academically, financially, and locally for the Baltimore community. Under his leadership Johns Hopkins University is now ranked 6th in the United States by U.S. News and World Report, and it continues to be home to one

of the world's leading hospitals and medical schools. Financially Daniels has been responsible for Hopkins' receiving billions of dollars in new support from generous donors for undergraduate education as well as for interdisciplinary research between members of its different schools. He has strengthened the University's ties to Baltimore with HopkinsLocal which hired hundreds of employees from within economically deprived neighborhood in the city. Hopkins is the largest private employer in the state of Maryland. He is speaking at a time when Universities are under attack. How can they respond? How will they respond?

In spite of a rough beginning, they were married a year and a half later. They have 2 daughters. One is a lawyer and the other has a PHD in Employee Assistance.

The first four years of their marriage were spent in the army, stationed at Ft Ord in California. They took advantage of their leave time to travel to Japan, Hong Kong and Thailand. After the army, they came back to Baltimore where Bob started his practice, and Arlene went to work for AAA, planning trips, doing the "Trip Tips" and making airline reservations. Later, she worked for Baltimore City Community College in their library for 30 years. She ordered supplies, worked with students for grants and did all the artwork in the library. 





Some of what Amy DeMaine does as Wellness Manager is out there for all to see: Three mornings each week she mounts the stage and leads an exercise class of up to 50 Octo-and Nonagenarians, who perform the routines "in sync" to Motown golden oldies.

She is a Certified Personal Trainer, a Certified Group Exercise Instructor and a Certified Senior Fitness Specialist. As a Personal Trainer she works with individual residents to design exercise programs that address their special needs. She works with the Assisted Rehab team and brings in guest instructors for yoga, meditation and Reiki. She also partners with Towson University's Kinesiology Department and involves Edenwald residents in curriculum development and senior research programs.

Amy will be with Edenwald four years in June and applied for scholarship funds for certifications in her second year here. The American Council on Exercise develops the programs and conducts the online tests. She plans on additional certifications for work with seniors to "keep current."

After three years' employment, an Edenwald staffer can apply for scholarship funds for family members. Last year, Amy's daughter Hannah received tuition assistance for her last two semesters at Harford Community College. She graduated from Harford with straight A's and a place on the President's List. And she works part-time at WaWa's.

She will be applying for Scholarship Fund assistance for UMBC Shady Grove Campus (near Gaithersburg).

Amy says Hannah wants to be in research—"drug research, disease research, any kind of research. She's a true scientist and has always been studious and focused on good grades. She's done so well."
