Edward Heimiller: Preserving Maryland State Treasures

The Maryland State Archives is the central depository for Maryland government records of permanent value as well as material pertinent to documenting life in Maryland. Their collection of artistic cultural property includes items used in the Maryland State House and the Governor's residence, Government House, as well as items from prominent Maryland families. With holdings dating from Maryland's founding in 1634 to the present, items routinely need attention to preserve and safeguard them

for future generations. Join Edward Heimiller, one of the two Conservators at the Maryland State Archives, for a discussion and closer look at some of these treasures, including documents from the American Revolution, and learn about recent conservation endeavors.

Our speaker, Edward Heimiller is a Conservation Specialist at the Maryland State Archives. He specializes in paper and painting conservation. He has over a decade of professional experience with Baltimore museums, previously serving as the Archivist of The Maryland Center for Military History, the Curator of The Stephen J. Ponzillo, Jr. Memorial Library and Museum (Maryland Masonic Museum), and Consulting Museum Registrar at Johns Hopkins University's Evergreen Museum and Library.

Doug Pasternak: Integrity Matters: Morals, Ethics, Politics & Democracy

Douglas Pasternak is a former two-time Emmy Award winning investigative reporter at U.S. News & World Report magazine and at NBC Nightly News. You may have also seen him teaching for OSHER here at Edenwald.

This presentation will review the central role integrity and ethics play in our democracy, despite numerous examples of corruption and abuse. It will review the history of political ethics from Socrates to John Quincy Adams to modern-day whistleblowers who have placed their lives and careers on the line for doing the right thing and sticking to their moral principles. It will utilize case examples to examine ethics and integrity through a nonpartisan political lens where the focus is on what is right and wrong, not blue or red, or Democratic or Republican. The presentation will also explore the challenges currently confronting America's moral compass and what is needed to reset our national ethical barometer to steer our nation in an honorable democratically sustainable direction.

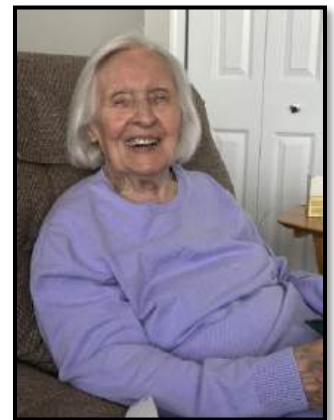
WELCOME NEW RESIDENT

Intro To Ballet- This is both a dance history and dance appreciation course combined. Participants will learn about the historical background of ballet before turning our attention to additional key figures who are important to mention. Those in attendance will learn about the different types of ballet as well as the different training methods that are available. Participants will also learn what life is like for young dancers studying and performing ballet, the evolution of the Pointe shoe, and how ballet continues to be accessible today to mature dancers as we age, offering opportunities for both training and performance. We will discuss the role of music and performance, training and education, the most famous ballet dancers to date, and explore the top 10 ballet companies in the U.S. while watching excerpts from some of their performances. We will also look at Ballet through several lens that include Identity and Ballet, Diversity and Inclusion, Ballet and Body Image, Belonging and Ballet, Ballet in Media and Culture, Community Engagement and Accessibility in Ballet, and of course, Ballet and Fashion!
